Fast forward 10 years. This same actor, Jonathan Roumie, was auditioning for Leonardo via Skype for

the role of Jesus, who appears on the screen in our live production of *Faustina: Messenger of Divine Mercy*.

"I told Leonardo that story," Jonathan remembers, "and he was very quiet for a second. Then he said, 'Clearly you're the guy for this role. Will you do it?' Without a pause, I answered, 'Yes."


And the rest is history. Not only does Jonathan play Jesus on the screen during our live *Faustina* production and in our upcoming film *Heart of Mercy*, he has gone on to play Christ in the popular video series, *The Chosen*.

Since that time, the *Faustina* live production has been performed for more than 43,000 people, and the film *Heart of*

Mercy is nearly complete. Jonathan was able to see the live show when it was in Los Angeles.

"It was life-changing spiritually for me to see the impact of my art directly affecting people on both an emotional and the spiritual level. Playing the role of Jesus has taught me so much! If we surrender to God completely, anything is not only possible, but promised. Because He is Mercy itself."

I was 18 years old when I played the leading role in the feature film *Thérèse*.

One of my favorite parts of the whole experience was encountering the Body of Christ in a very real way. I was on my way to converting to the Catholic faith and had been mostly on my own. Through this project, I was welcomed into an enormous Catholic family.

As a non-Catholic, I didn't really grasp at first what a big deal Thérèse was. Meeting people with an intense devotion to her, I worried I wouldn't do her justice. I was nervous about the illness and death scenes.

But the death scene was, in the end, the greatest joy to film. Everyone on set grew still and attentive. Leonardo and Patti had a relic of St. Thérèse pinned to the underside of the sheet of my death bed so I could have her with me. Because the script had been altered, I didn't have all the lines memorized. Yet the words were there on my lips when I needed them. The whole illness and death sequence felt covered in grace for everyone involved and made a lasting impact on me.

After filming *Thérèse*, I studied theater and film and received my bachelor's and master's degrees. I married my best friend and seriously discerned pursuing an acting

career. By the time we had our second child, I wanted to devote my energy and attention to my family.

I now have seven children. Thérèse's Little Way has been a life-saving guide through motherhood. It's helped me find joy and purpose in the seemingly ordinary and meaningless tasks of everyday life —offering them for Jesus, and seeing them as active, living prayers.

I have struggled to see God as a tender, loving Father who wills my good. Thérèse's humility was genuine precisely because she knew and believed God loved her totally and absolutely. She had nothing to fear since she was comfortable surrendering to a tender and loving Father's will. That kind of trust is something I still pray for through her intercession.

BRINGING CONTINUITY TO THE TOLTON FILM.

WHICH TAKE WOULD YOU CHOOSE?

Notice how Jim's hands are different in the two takes.







Have you ever played the game where you're given two pictures that, at first glance, look the same, but then you have to find the differences between them? That's kind of like what we're doing with the *Tolton* editing project right now!

Imagine you're the editor for this film. You'd have to be on the lookout for subtle changes.

Here you have pictures from two different takes (which means we filmed the scene twice – each time was a "take" of the same scene). Maybe you noticed that Jim, the actor, has his hands together in Take 1 but his hands are apart in Take 2.

Cutting from Take 1 to the new camera angle pictured here would be distracting and look wrong: hands together, to hands immediately apart. But if you match Take 2 with this camera angle, your audience will barely notice the cut, because Jim's hands are in the exact same position.

Way to go! You just created continuity in the film – one of the most important tasks of an editor. Would you continue to pray for our real editor and director?






